Dear Friends in Christ,

At certain times of the year, pastors and churches take a collective deep breath. The week after Easter is one of those times. The busyness of the holidays has passed, the extra services are over, and things have slowed down and gotten back to normal. And that is when we need to be cautious. Cautious because it is too easy to forget the joy that the Easter message brings to our lives and we leave it behind.

Looking to God's Word, we find two disciples of Christ who doing just that. Luke tells us in the twenty-fourth chapter that these two men had left Jerusalem and were walking on the road to Emmaus. They knew Jesus to be a mighty prophet in word and deed. They had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel, but he had been crucified and their hopes had died with them. Sure, they had heard the news of the resurrection, but they did not believe perhaps because it had been reported by some of the women and none of the male disciples had seen anything but an empty tomb.

How often do we too feel like these disciples? How often do we get stuck in the past, looking backwards. Often our hopes and dreams dashed. When we think things are going one way, they go the other. Life never goes as we plan, but throws us with sudden twists and turns. So what do you do when life leaves you reeling, questioning, and doubting? What do you do when your hopes and dreams are crushed?

Life throws sudden twists and turns at us and they leave us reeling, questioning, doubting. So what do you do when your hopes and dreams are shattered and left in ruins? Where do you turn? How do you cope?

For the two disciples on the road, Jesus came into their lives. As the men journey to Emmaus Jesus "drew near and went with them." It's a beautiful picture of what Christ does for us. He seeks us. God himself became one of us, drew near to us and goes with us. As the resurrected Lord journeyed with his confused disciples, he opened up the Scriptures to them and interpreted everything in God's Word concerning himself. The entire Bible is about him, this Savior, who died for the world and rose again. Though the disciples thought they wanted a Savior from the Romans, they got something so much greater. They got a Savior from sin and eternal death. They got a Savior who won a complete victory and then gave it to them! That is the Savior that we have, the Savior who has conquered sin, death and the devil for us.

But the story doesn't end with that Easter journey. For the disciples convince Jesus to remain with them, still not knowing who he is. Luke tells us that when Jesus takes bread, blesses it, breaks it and gives it to them, their eyes are opened. Their Savior is present with them in this bread even though He disappears from their view. In our confusion, as we walk along on our own roads, Christ comes along side us; He also opens the Scriptures to us, He also takes bread and gives it to us! Gathered together here at Prince of Peace we are assured that the risen Savior is present when we partake of that bread together. Even though our hopes and dreams may be crushed from time to time, Christ comes into our lives and assures us of his resurrection and his victory. This month of April, don't leave Easter behind. Come and share in the victory over death that Christ offers you! Come and see your Savior in the Scriptures. Come and see Him present with us in the bread that He offers.

Alleluia, He is risen! He is risen indeed, Alleluia!

Alleluia! Christ Is Risen!

What a beautiful day the Lord provided for us to celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus! The church was nearly full including some returning and first time visitors. Church attendance was good for all the Holy Week services. Pastor Michael has been assisting in worship for the last month and was able to lead the entire service on Maundy Thursday. We have one more sermon in the *Blessed Are the Peacemakers* series on April 3 and the Bible studies that follow.

Several people have asked what is next. Pastor Michael, the Elders and Council have been discussing this throughout March and at the Voters' Meeting. We don't have all the details yet, but here is what we are planning for now.

Pastor Michael will resume preaching beginning April 10. He will enlist assistance from the Elders (or me) as needed to lead worship. I will be transitioning into more of a consulting/mentoring role as we seek to implement what we have learned from the Peacemaker resources. The Voters have also decided that Prince of Peace is now in a position to implement the recommendations made as a result of the survey taken last summer by the Pittsburgh Pastoral Institute. However I will be leading that implementation in conjunction with the Elders and Council.

Therefore, I will still be around for a while as needed. I will probably worship with you most Sundays and perhaps lead a Bible study. I will be scheduling private interviews with anyone who would like to talk to me about any conflicts that may require some mediation assistance or about your vision for the future of Prince of Peace. We will also be planning some group "listening events" to get input from the congregation.

Pastor Michael and I will also be attending a training workshop in Charlotte, NC by Ted Kober and Ambassadors of Reconciliation the first week of May.

Stay tuned for further details!

Paul wrote to the church at Corinth, "God made Him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in Him we might become the righteousness of God." That is what Jesus did for us on Good Friday. "He died for all, that those who live should no longer live for themselves, but for Him who died for them and was raised again. ...Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation, the old has gone, the new has come. All this is from God who reconciled us to Himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation that God was reconciling the world to Himself in Christ, not counting men's sins against them. And He has committed to us the message of reconciliation. **We are therefore Christ's ambassadors**, as though God were making His appeal through us." (2 Cor 5:18-21)

Think about that last sentence. Isn't that another way of expressing the Great Commission to go and make disciples of all people? Isn't that who Jesus is calling us to be? Isn't that our mission as a church? We are His ambassadors to whom He has given the message of reconciliation so that God can make His appeal to our lost and broken families and neighbors through us.

‘Smart’ Planning Gives Twice

Being smart has both spiritual and temporal dimensions. Intelligence from faith often produces an outcome different from worldly intelligence. Christian stewards recognize that they are not owners but managers, called to protect property and provide for people under their care so it/they flourish to the potential and purpose intended by the Creator.

Intelligence in the temporal dimension usually reflects natural laws. People tend to focus on their own blood relations, where emotional and physical connections exist. Modern laws of property distribution follow the logic of ancient laws to give property ‘through the bloodline’ using Latin words like ‘per stirpes.’ Under the law, being smart follows such logic. Family members are the natural objects of bounty, so most people limit estate planning decisions to benefit their own families.

The intelligence of faith comes from a person’s soul and spirit, and informs a person’s physical connections. Being aware of our “faith smarts” involves how a concern for others, even the least of these, is remembered in planning.

A Christian’s motivation flows from their baptism; from Christ’s redemption from sin and eternal death. God’s Word tells us that such grace is a gift of God. It results in spiritual intelligence - in listening to God’s calling to serve others and to be generous for the purpose of advancing Christ’s kingdom.

Current tax laws encourage a smart planner to explore ways to conserve tax shrinkage in property transfers. These laws give incentives to charitable gift planning through estate and income tax deductions. Thus, even though our laws don’t require such sharing, public policy confirms that generosity makes our world better.

Whether smart planning remembers family or ministry or both, intelligence that plans with both the heart and the mind can be how God blesses the people we love and ministries we care about.

The 2016 Eastern District Futures Task Force has assembled women and men, pastors and lay leaders from across the district to look at questions facing our church in the future. Your assistance is needed with one of the questions, "What is it to be the church?" In order to best secure answers to that question, the Task Force has designed two surveys intended for people age 35 and below.


Two different surveys have been developed in order to reach two different subsets of this age group. One survey, for those not affiliated or loosely affiliated with the church, is comprised of three open-ended questions. The second survey, comprises of seven multiple choice questions, is intended for millennials IN your church or circle of Christian relationships.
