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The Bells

Sinning – It's just like breathing (almost)

Dear Friends in Christ,

I breathe. I'm usually not away of it. Sometimes I breathe in, and sometimes I breathe out. I'll breathe through my nose and I'll breathe through my mouth. Sometimes, for a bit of variety, I'll hold my breath and stop breathing. In my prime I could stop for just over a minute, but now I'm fortunate to be able to stop for 30 seconds. Eventually, I have to breathe again.

Breathing is just a part of life. I breathe and most of the time I don't ever think about it. But...but there are times when breathing is all I think about. The pollen count is high; the air is extremely cold; the fur of certain cats and dogs; I forget to take my asthma medication – breathing becomes more difficult. My chest feels like it is wrapped and tightly bound, I cough and wheeze – I cannot catch my breath. I need help, rescue and thanks be to God that modern medicine has provided rescue inhalers. I am saved. I can breathe again.

Sin is just like breathing. It is a constant part of our lives. Because Adam sinned against God, the created world came under a curse. As a result, our natural state was no longer "very good" as God once described us, but "sinful and uncleaned." We call this state "original sin."

As a result, we sin. Paul tells us in Romans, "None is righteous, no, not one." He goes on to quote the Old Testament to show that no one does good. No one seeks after God, understands him or fears him. Rather, people deceive, curse and shed blood. It seems as if sin is as natural for us as breathing.

Sometimes we sin with our thoughts – lustful, impure thoughts of another, or we carry anger or resentment instead of forgiving and letting go. Sometimes we sin with our words, a careless word spoken at the wrong time, a hateful word spoken to belittle or hurt. And sometimes we sin with our deeds, things we do and things we don't do. Sometimes, through sheer act of will, we can stop sinning for a while. But eventually, our sinful nature drags us back into the muck and mire and we start sinning again.

We sin. Sometimes we're not aware of it. We don't think about it, but sometimes, sometimes it's all we can think about. Like a man struggling for breath, we wrestle with our sinful nature. It hinders us, it crushes us. We drown in our guilt. This is what the God's Law does for us when it reveals our sinful nature. You see, sin was not part of what God had planned for us. It's not *natural*. The Lutheran Confessions state that the chief force of the Law is that it reveals original sin with all its fruits and shows man how very low his nature has fallen. And unlike a man struggling for breath, this is a good thing – a very good thing. For now we know that we need help – a rescue.

Jesus Christ is our "rescue inhaler". He came to free us from the struggle, the wrestle with our sinful nature. We are saved, no longer "crushed" by the weight of our guilt because we know that we have been freed by the body and blood of Jesus, shed on the cross. For us the Law is no longer a source of terror, but a comforting guide on how we ought to live our lives as redeemed children of God. In joyous thanksgiving for all that God has done for us, we now strive to live that way.

We have a promise: one day when our Lord and Savior returns we will be permanently freed from our sinful nature. All the things that go along with it; our sicknesses, our bad habits, our death – everything that results from the curse that came when sin entered the world will be removed as well. And then, we will never think about our sins again.

Reaching the Millennial Generation

At the Regional Outreach Conference hosted by Lutheran Hour Ministries last August I listened to a presentation about the Millennial generation. Millennial generation defines a populations segment born between 1980 and 2000. The presentation focused on who the Millennials are and how to share the Gospel with them.

According to the Pew Research/UCLA study the Millennial Generation has the following attributes:

- Highest percentage of college students
- Many live at home with their parents
- Liberal in their thinking but conservative on issues such as abortion
- They are less religious. Only 15% ranked living religiously as a high priority
- Prefer structured lives
- Perceive boundaries as judgmental
- 4 out of 5 attend a church but do not attend on a regular basis
- When they go to college, most of them leave the church

What are their priorities?

- Friends and Family (Eph. 3:15 tells us to place high priority on friends and family)
- Parenting (Matthew 19:5-6 & Psalm 127:3-5)
- God's way is also built around the principle of giving and serving others (Acts 20:35)

How do we reach and share the Gospel with this generation of people?

- Beef up our church's web site and use the latest technology such as Facebook, Twitter, and other social messaging.
- Keep messages short and to the point
- Make Christ relevant to them. What has Christ done in your life?
- Invite them to a dinner or social event at church
- They are a people of action. Give them responsibility and let them lead.

We have a mighty Savior and a special message to give. Since they are seeking meaning and purpose in their lives we have to connect with them and explain the life saving message of Jesus Christ. And when we reach out, be prepared to listen like you mean it. It is so critical to understand the person that you are talking to; if we don't listen they will certainly know.

"But in your hearts set apart Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect."
