

Among all the papers that Katya and Niko brought home at the end of the school year was a list of websites so that they could have some practice work for the summer. It's a list of games they can do to practice math and reading skills, to remember social studies and science facts.

Homework in the summer...seems wrong somehow. Summer is the time for parks and pools, for late-night games of hide-n-go seek in the neighborhood. Summer is the time for camping trips and vacations by the beach. Summer isn't the time for schoolwork and math facts. Except...

Except studies show that when school starts in the fall students have forgotten some of what they knew. Teachers, then, have to spend a few weeks, or months re-teaching what those students once knew.

Even as adults this phenomenon affects us. I vaguely remember some of my engineering lessons from twenty years ago. The ability to remember programming languages and calculus is fading with time. If you don't use it, you lose it.

Paul writes to the Philippians: "Therefore, my beloved, as you have always obeyed, so now, not only as in my presence but much more in my absence, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling." (Phil. 2:12 ESV)

"Work out" – sounds like a lot like "practice, practice, practice" doesn't it? Paul is saying to bring to completion, make perfect your salvation. In other words, practice makes perfect.

Now, Paul isn't saying that your salvation depends on your work, on what you do. In fact, in the very next verse he says that it is "God who works in you" meaning that it is God who gives you the power and energy both "to will and to do His good pleasure."

You and I are saved by the work Christ has done on the cross. We have been brought to faith in this by the Word of God. "Faith comes by hearing and hearing through the Word of God." Paul is encouraging us to be workman unto salvation. He's saying, don't be slothful. Don't neglect the study of the Word; don't neglect the Sacraments. This is how we work out our salvation, by staying in the Word, by coming to Worship.

Summertime, vacation time tempts us to take it easy, to avoid church when we're traveling, to avoid Bible study when we're home. And God knows this, so he encourages us to continue to work out our salvation in all fear and trembling, to come to Him humbly and in prayer and seek Him in His Word.

"And I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ." (Phil 1:6 ESV)

THE ORIGIN OF BRAILLE

French Captain Charles Barbier, in the early 1800's tried to develop a method that military officers could use to read messages and orders in the dark while in battle. Lighting a torch, or even a match to have enough light to read the message could very well alert the enemy to their location.

Barbier developed a method of reading in the dark he called "night writing." The system consisted of a series of twelve raised dots, each arranged in a different pattern for various sounds in the language. To test the system out, he found a 13 year old blind boy and taught him how the system worked.

The boy struggled to learn the system but ultimately failed. It was just too complicated to learn. Barbier gave up on further developing his "night writing" system. The boy, however did not give up. Rather he spent two years refining the system and ultimately cut the number of dots down to only six and instead of each grouping standing for various sounds in the language, he made each series represent one letter of the alphabet, His "new" system spread widely—and is still in use today. The boy's name? Louis Braille.

STEWARDSHIP MESSAGE

At the beginning of the second paragraph of the Declaration of Independence we read these words: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." This document was the unanimous Declaration of the thirteen United States of America in Congress on July 4, 1776.

These words are pretty easy to recite, but so difficult to practice. For one thing, freedom is never free. It comes only through great cost, including the sacrifice of dedicated men and women in defense of our national freedoms. In addition, the stain of sin causes us to treat our fellow citizens as inferior according to our own definitions and practices.

The LCMS defines stewardship: "Christian stewardship is the <u>free and joyous</u> <u>activity</u> of the child of God and God's family, the church, in managing all of life and life's resources for God's purposes."

Really--Christian stewardship free and joyous??? Too often we have all kinds of words that describe Christian stewardship as anything but free and joyous. How can it be free? It is free because the price for it, like the freedom we enjoy as Americans, has been paid for by the sacrifice of someone else. Jesus, through His bitter suffering, death and glorious resurrection, has freed us to be the children of God who delight in doing what God delights in doing—loving and giving!

So, is it easy to practice free and joyous Christian stewardship? Hardly, because so many false notions drive us into other directions. We think we have earned what we have and can use it in any way we choose. We think that we own all kinds of material possessions rather than acknowledging that God is the rightful Owner and we are simply His managers.

How do we become good managers who freely and joyfully practice good stewardship? Left to ourselves we will fail over and over again. But through the marvelous working of the Holy Spirit we are equipped to excel as Christian stewards. Through conversion (by baptism and/or confirmation) we are miraculously brought into the family of God. Through sanctification (growth in Christian living) the Holy Spirit continues to build us up as God's joyful stewards.

How does this happen? The Holy Spirit works through the Word of God, the sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion, worship, prayer and the mutual encouragement of fellow brothers and sisters in Christ. The Holy Spirit does for us what we cannot do for ourselves. In gratitude for His working in us, let's resolve to become more and more what God has already declared us in Christ to be, namely, His children (See 1 John 3:1 for scriptural evidence of this miracle). *Yes indeed, maturing stewards freely and joyfully manage all of life and life's resources for God's purposes!*

NEWS FROM CHRISTOPHER S. AHLMAN SERVING THE LORD IN GERMANY

"Whew!!!" Since I last wrote, we've:

- 1) prepared in earnest for our deployment to Leipzig;
- 2) said our final "Farewell"s before flying out;
- 3) boarded the three flights that collectively got us to Leipzig;
- 4) met up with colleagues and their families at the Leipzig-Halle International Airport;
- 5) got settled in our temporary apartment;
- 6) became acquainted with our new congregation and its pastor;
- 7) became acquainted with nearby shops for living needs (a process that is more difficult than usual but easier than easier than one might expect) and the Leipzig Tram and Bus;
- 8) processed our registration and residence and employment visas;
- 9) planned out and ordered our kitchen at IKEA (German apartments customarily come with a bare room for a kitchen, with one having to acquire everything in it!), and oversaw its installation;
- 10) secured a German bank account;
- 11) received all our possessions entirely intact (!) from the US at our permanent apartment;
- 12) ordered MANY new pieces of furniture (numbering approximately 20 items), all of which we have assembled ourselves;

As I type this, we are:

- 1) working to find a Kindergarten place for Thomas (Germany currently has more Kindergarten-age children than Kindergarten open spots, and it is a constant struggle for all involved);
- 2) attending meetings on a regular basis concerning the shape, direction, and timetable for outreach initiatives in Leipzig;
- 3) exposing ourselves to musical events at Leipzig churches, getting a "feel" for what is currently offered in the city;
- 4) entering the "finishing touch" stage of our permanent apartment;
- 5) preparing for the 22-23 May Concordia University—Nebraska A Cappella Choir concerts at Lukaskirche;
- 6) beginning the process of contracting a German tutor;
- 7) taking time for special family outings and events;
- 8) giving moral support to Matthias, who is currently enduring the entrance of 4-6 teeth simultaneously. Thus far, we have found Leipzig to be a beautiful and eclectic city. English speakers can be found but do not abound (contra many parts of former West Germany), and this is good for us, as it assists and encourages us in our "inner push" to learn German better and quicker. While the present reunified Germany is certainly evident in many respects, so is its recent past as a former East German city. A brief panoramic glimpse at the Hauptbahnhof gives one a good snapshot of the cosmopolitan character of Leipzig. All nationalities, mentalities, postures, fashions, and circumstances of life are here to stay. Among this array, of course, is Jesus Christ, the Lord of the cosmos, who will work his mighty and gracious work "when and where he pleases in those who May God in Christ through the Spirit bless you now and forever.
