### Bringing People To Church

Why do people come to Church? A simple question, with not so simple answers. Current surveys suggest that people go to church to “connect with others”. They go to be “a part of something bigger.” They go because of the programs or the volunteer opportunities. Some go because the pastor preaches well, or because of the style of service music. Of course, all these answers are coming from a worldly view point.

The bible tells us that people come to Church for one, simple reason: they are fallen and broken sinners. The guilt of their sins weighs them down and they know that only through the blood of Jesus Christ can they be forgiven.

So, the Holy Spirit calls them, gathers them, enlightens them with gifts through Word and Sacrament which brings to them, pardon and peace.

Does that mean we cannot like the music? No. Does that mean we cannot connect with family and friends? Of course not. Music adds to the beauty of worship. We serve God in fellowship by serving our neighbor and by bearing one another’s burdens. But what should be the primary reason for Church? Where should our passion lie?

We must remember that when the Holy Spirit calls, gathers and enlightens people in Church through the ministry of Word and Sacrament that is CHRIST REACHING OUT TO YOU.

Having been fed on the body and blood of our Lord, having been strengthened by His Word, we are able to bring Christ to people during our daily lives. We refer to this as “outreach” for we go outside the church walls to reach the unchurched. But “outreach” can be a negative term because it says that “people are more valuable when they are on the outside than on the inside.” Outreach makes it seem like our only goal is to increase the number of people on the “inside”, without dealing with the cares and concerns of people.

Can you imagine a shepherd who gathers his sheep into a pen and then never feeds them, waters them, or cares for them? What happens to the sheep?

Instead of outreach, we need to focus on evangelism. To “evangelize” simply means to bring good news. Evangelism is the work of sharing the good news of Jesus with all those who have not heard of Him. But it’s also the work of carrying the grace and comfort to those within the church.

Evangelism succeeds when we pray for those outside the church. Evangelism succeeds when we help them in their physical needs AND speak to them about the love of Christ. Evangelism succeeds when we notice those missing from worship and we call them, “where were you today? I missed you.”

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On the weekend of Sept. 15<sup>th</sup>, the leadership of Prince of Peace is going to be the re:Vitality program. “Vital” is the key component of “revitalization.” Wherever the Word is proclaimed in its purity and God’s Sacraments are rightly administered, there is spiritual vitality. But is spiritual vitality enough for a congregation to be vital? Congregational vitality begins with spiritual vitality, but it also includes factors that affect its ability to begin, increase or continue activities that convey the spiritual vitality of Word and Sacrament ministry. The re: Vitality program will help us to determine where we’re at in our stage of vitality and the most effective ways to preserve, increase, or restore vitality to Prince of Peace.

Please pray for us as we go through the program and as we bring to you, the result of it.

Dear Pastor Podeszwa, treasurer Licht, and members of Prince of Peace,

We were so delighted to receive notice from St. Louis today, that your congregation has become a Together in Mission partner with us, in support of God's work through us in the Dominican Republic and Latin America. Thank you!

Our arrival and adjustment to living in the DR has gone quite smoothly, thanks be to God. Regarding prayer for us, our biggest challenge so far has probably been our health and recovering from various unique incidences. Cheryl spent the first three weeks suffering from allergies, which have flared up from time to time. Interestingly, eating the local honey - made from pollen from the trees to which I'm allergic - has helped with her immunity and has reduced my allergy symptoms! She also broke the tip of her right ring finger after slamming it in a door, and that has healed well. Pastor Jonathan took a bad fall on a wet street, but the sprained ankle is now fine, and last week was attacked and bitten by a street dog, and that has turned out ok too. All this since our arrival on May 23. So we have these types of smaller challenges to deal with. We pray that God will protect us from any other hindrances to our work!

We did have a wonderful region missionary retreat this week, worshipping and praying together, studying God's Word, and enjoying rest with all of the LCMS missionaries who serve in Latin America, before returning to our various places of service.

It is the congregations and people who hold us in prayer and encourage us, that make a great difference to our life on the field. It just makes a huge difference, knowing that others are speaking to the Lord on our behalf, are with us in spirit and moral support, and in agreement with the mission of bringing Christ to all the nations.
