"Now after John was arrested, Jesus came into Galilee, proclaiming the gospel of God, and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent and believe in the gospel."

Mark 1:14-15

Another season of Lent will soon be upon us. Ash Wednesday begins with a reminder of cold, dark reality. God said to the man after his fall into sin, "for you are dust, and to dust you shall return." (Gen 3:19) With the advent of sin, man was destined to die and return to the earth for which he was created. Adam's DNA contained sin which was passed down

<u>preschool@</u> princeofpeacefreedom.com to all mankind. This defect in our DNA is the cause of everything that leads to death, as well as eternal death in hell. During the season of Lent, we're to examine ourselves and realize this truth. Lent is a holy season of prayerful and penitential reflection. As it says in the Ash Wednesday address, "Lent is a time of special devotion, self-denial, and humble repentance borne of a faithful heart that dwells confidently on His Word and draws from it life and hope." (LSB) And "Our attention is especially directed to the holy sufferings and death of our Lord Jesus Christ." (LSB)

The entire Lenten season can be summed up in what Mark recorded Jesus saying in V15, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent and believe in the *aospel.*" (Mk 1:15) The Kingdom has come in the advent of Jesus. And the verb "is" emphasizes the completed action, even though Jesus says this early on in Mark's gospel account. Jesus came to fulfill all of God's promises about the salvation of the world. Though "Good Friday" was a long way off, throughout Jesus' ministry, He invited people to enjoy God's kind rule by living under His grace and righteousness. The preaching of the Gospel, in its proper sense, doesn't mean the preaching of repentance, but only the preaching of God's grace, which follows directly after the preaching of repentance. It's in our penitential reflection that we realize our tremendous need for forgiveness and a Savior. But prayerful and penitential reflection shouldn't be

relegated to the season of Lent only. "Humble repentance borne of a faithful heart that dwells confidently on His Word" (LSB), should take place each and every time before receiving the "Lord's Supper." Every Divine Service is a mini-Easter celebration. in which we begin with confession, a mini-Lent. And then we hear God's Word read and preached. It's the hearing of God's Law and Gospel proclaimed, in true doctrine, which is true worship. This leads us to true repentance and only then do we receive forgiveness, pardon and peace in the Lord's Supper, which we draw life and hope from. And so, we're doing as Christ commanded, we're repenting and believing in His Gospel. But the season of Lent "is a time of special devotion." Lent is a holy season in which we take time out during the week and our busy schedules to worship God, in Christ Jesus, on Wednesday evening, so that

People are really big on giving up something for Lent. They don't do it to draw closer to Christ. They do it so they can say they've given something up in order to be and sound holy. But giving something up for Lent doesn't make you holy, it just makes you more sinful because it becomes works righteousness. What we need to give up during the season of Lent is time spent in the world and give in to spending time with God in personal devotions & worship. Let Jesus' words of "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent and believe in the gospel." (Mk 1:15) to resonate within you, as your attention is especially directed to the holy sufferings and death of our Lord Jesus Christ during this Lententide season. And may you come to Easter with a different appreciation for Christ's redeeming work.



HAPPY NEW YEAR, everyone!! May this new year bring joy and happiness to you and your family! All preschool classes jumped back into school after a quick "show and tell". All the boys and girls were permitted to bring his or her favorite Christmas gift. We do this every year because the children love to talk about their holiday and themselves.

It was nice during the month of January to have full weeks of instruction again since the holiday season is over. We learned four new letters during our writing skills lessons with the four-year-olds in January. We learned the letters; N, Y, D, and Z. The four-year-olds also spent time doing a letter review of all the letters we have learned so far this school year. They are preparing for kindergarten so we spent some time writing our numbers too. The kids did a great job learning how to write numbers 1-5 so far. We will write up to 10 this year but count out loud to 30. Towards the end of the month, we focused on animals that hibernate. We talked about what it means to hibernate and which animals typically do so. We always had crafts that go with lessons and even our three-year-old class took home a book about hibernation. For all classes we even snuck in a day to watch a movie and wear pajamas to school. The three-year-olds watched Paw Patrol Movie, and the four-year-olds watched the movie, Sonic the Hedgehog. We all enjoyed some delicious snacks. We also started talking about our five senses and of course rounding out the end of the month we held chapel where we invited parents/guardians to attend.

Disaster Response Team Trinity Lutheran Church, Tyler, Texas | \$100,000



Operation Christmas Child Update

Thank you to the many members and friends of Prince of Peace who have supported the Shoebox Ministry in the past. In 2024, we were blessed to deliver 126 boxes to the collection center-boxes full of school supplies, hygiene items and *FUN* items, like stuffed animals, musical instruments, dolls, cars and trucks.

We tracked our boxes all the way to Botswana, a landlocked country in the center of Southern Africa. The territory is roughly triangular—approximately 600 miles (965 km) from north to south and 600 miles from east to west. Within the confines of Botswana's borders is a rich variety of wildlife, including many species of mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians, and fish.

A country of slightly over 2.3 million people, Botswana is one of the most sparsely populated countries in the world.



Please continue to pray that the Holy Spirit will touch the hearts of the children who received the boxes and participate in the Greatest Journey discipleship course.

Collection efforts for 2024 are already underway. There are many ways to help:

Concordia Lutheran Ministries needs help.

What is needed are people to help residents get to church. All off these church services are in the facility in which these residents live. Many residents are in wheel chairs and getting to and from church services is a struggle and in some cases an impossibility for them to do on their own. The activity department staff helps as do a few other staff as they are able, but often the need is greater than what they can provide. Anyone who has an interest in helping others get to church, helping them get to a place that is comfortable for them in church, possibly giving a hand with the church service and making sure residents get back to their room could really be a valuable and helpful presence. Doing this for residents would also be a way of serving the Lord.
